Judge Halts Warrantless Wiretapping Program

As reported by the <u>AP</u>, "A federal judge ruled Thursday that the government's warrantless wiretapping program is unconstitutional and ordered an immediate halt to it." The <u>ACLU</u> brought this lawsuit after <u>the spying program</u> was first disclosed.

This is a huge victory in the fight to stop the government's massive and illegal surveillance. This ruling deals with the so-called "Terrorist Surveillance Program."

EFF has <u>sued AT&T</u> for its role in the NSA's illegal spying, which we allege goes beyond what the President has directly admitted. Last month, Judge Walker <u>rejected</u> the government's motion to dismiss based on state secrets, along with AT&T's motion to dismiss, and allowed the case to go forward.

- "[T]he court finds Defendants' argument that they cannot defend this case without the use of classified information to be disingenuous and without merit."

- "Our constitution was drafted by founders and ratified by a people who still held in vivid memory the image of King George III and his General Warrants.... These secret authorization orders must ... fall."
