Women in US workforce climb to highest since 2002, record low unemployment rate for Blacks

The Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) released its monthly Employment Situation Report, showcasing the highest level of prime-age women in the U.S. workforce in more than 17 years and a record low unemployment rate for blacks.

Labor force participation for prime-aged women (25 to 54 years old) climbed to 76.3%, up a full percentage point from July and the highest since February 2002.

BLS said the number of people employed in the United States hit a record 1.58 million in August, the 21st record set under President Donald Trump, adding 590,000 from July.

The unemployment rate held steady at 3.7%. For blacks, the unemployment rate dropped to a record low of 5.5%, presenting the smallest gap on record between the unemployment rates for blacks and whites.

The unemployment rate for black women also fell to a record 4.4% from 5.2% in July.

These figures completely reverse the efforts of critics and media trying to speculate about fear of recession on the horizon in the coming months.
